

About the Opera

CHARACTERS:

Karen Porter: Soprano -

Rebecca, her friend

The two friends connected long ago in elementary school as kindred spirits. They remained friends all the way through high school. After graduation, Karen leaves for Berlin for a gap year. The two friends make bracelets for the other and a pact to keep connected. The year is long. This aria takes place as they get together the day Karen returns home.

What is happening?

• The intertwining lives of Rebecca & Karen, two girls growing up together, besties into young adulthood. When Karen takes a gap year to live in Berlin, Rebecca finds work in their hometown of Norwalk, Connecticut. They keep in touch, but when Karen returns, Norwalk is the same but Karen is not. The two women must now confront what their relationship is, who they are for one another and how they manage to take their long term friendship into the future while embracing a new way of seeing the world around them.

Who is present?

• Rebecca is in the room with Karen - they have just had an argument within minutes of not having seen one another in well over a year.

Who wants what and why?

• Rebecca wants to pick up where they left off but Karen has to admit, she has changed.

Where is the tension?

• Both women want to connect but they have to come to terms with the reality that their connection must come from a new place. The old way doesn't work and they almost lose one another. Both have to adjust. They find something and make a new pact.

The 5 Whys

Why is this important to the character?

 Karen has had an eye opening experience living abroad. Her world has expanded far beyond the insular Norwalk, CT. She wants to show her best friend what she's discovered.

Why is this important to the audience?

 The audience has witnessed Karen's transformation and they need to know how the two friends will remain connected.

Why is this important to the plot?

 This scene is right after the peripeteia of our opera, Karen's moment of 'wokeness', and it's important to see if she will maintain her new world-understanding upon going home. The two have just had an argument.

Why is this important to the pacing?

 This aria is near the end as we move into the concluding scenes & resolve the story arc of this long term friendship.

Why is this important to the creative team? Jane and I explore the pains and joys of friendship, expressed musically. It is bitter sweet.

Libretto

The arc of this aria is to capture their past relationship, understand their present relationship and see their future relationship. Dramatic question: Can friendship endure when we are no longer certain we know one another like we once did?

Location: Rebecca's bedroom (still the same from childhood)

Current status of the moment: The two friends (now young women) have just had an argument while standing amid their childhood memories. On Rebecca's bedside table is the music box she plays every night before she goes to sleep. This is the deep breath right after the fight. Karen chooses to reach out in the midst of a painful moment.
